

PRESIDENTS' GOOD STEWARD AWARD



Robert Goodby *Franklin Pierce University*

Dr. Robert Goodby, Professor of Anthropology and Director of the Honors Program, has brought new vision and energy to the Honors Program of Franklin Pierce University. He has revised the curriculum structure to provide more of a cohort experience, and worked with Honors students to develop a student organization that maximizes self-governance. He expanded the programs community involvement by introducing a Community Service Committee that will be hosting its first events this semester. Dr. Goodby is also instrumental to the annual Academic Showcase where the work of Franklin Pierce students and faculty are put on display for the campus and area communities. Annually, Dr. Goodby brings anthropology students to Keene Middle School where they spend a morning teaching archaeology and local history to the entire 6th grade. He has also worked with faculty at Keene Middle School to develop interpretive signage for an educational boardwalk extending into Tenant Swamp. Every fall, Dr. Goodby brings the Anthropology Club students to the Harvest Moon Festival at the Mount Kearsarge Indian Museum in Warner to demonstrate and teach about the atlatl to museum visitors. Dr. Goodby shares his interest and research in the native peoples of New England with the broader community through the “Humanities to Go” speaker series of New Hampshire Humanities. Over the last 12 years, he has given more than 110 presentations, in venues ranging from libraries to synagogues to the NH State Prison.
